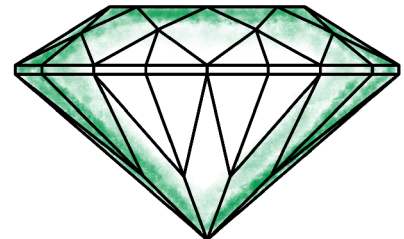

THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR GREEN DIAMOND

The **Green** color in this 3.02 carat diamond is typically caused by the absorption of red light waves, after a subterranean radiation exposure altered the atomic structure of the diamond, leading to its molecules absorbing red light and contributing to the green hue.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

The grade '**Fancy**' represents a level with a significant presence of color and accounts for **25%** of all Green fancy Color diamonds.

There are Six available saturation levels in Green color diamonds, Fancy being the Fourth most saturated.

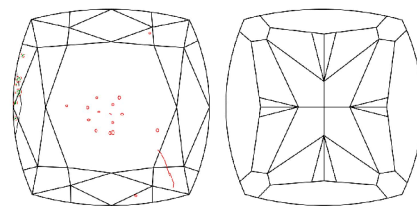

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

The **Cushion** shape dates back to the early days when diamonds were initially made to decorate crowns of royalty. Today, the Cushion shape is still the most popular jewelry shape, and it is also yields the highest possible weight from rough diamonds. The pavilion on the bottom of your stone has a Starburst facet alignment to reinforce color reflection and brilliance. **29%** from all Green fancy color diamonds are polished as Cushion / Radiant.



TRUE FACE-UP

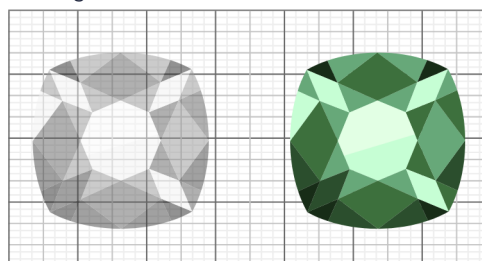
The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority. Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

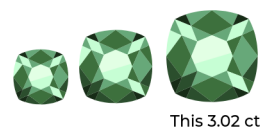

THE SI1 CLARITY IN THIS FANCY GREEN DIAMOND

The impact of the **SI1** clarity, in a Fancy Green, Cushion cut, is negligible compared to colorless diamonds especially when it is not visible to the naked eye. The SI1 clarity grade represents 14% of all Fancy Green diamonds in the 3 - 3.99 carat weight category.

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THE FAINT BLUE FLUORESCENT IN THIS DIAMOND

Fluorescence refers to the emission of visible light when a diamond is exposed to UV light. The fluorescence in this diamond is caused by the presence of trace elements within the lattice of the diamond. When a diamond is exposed to UV light, these elements absorb the energy from the UV light. They become excited, and as a result, release energy in the form of a Blue glow. The **Faint Blue** fluorescence in this 3.02 carat has no impact on its quality. It is impossible to spot a glow of this **Faint Blue** Fluorescence in the diamond without a special UV light device.



HOW RARE IS THIS 3.02 CARAT?

- Only **1 in ~ 5,000,000** diamonds will have similar characteristics
- A similar diamond enters the market once every **3 To 4 years**
