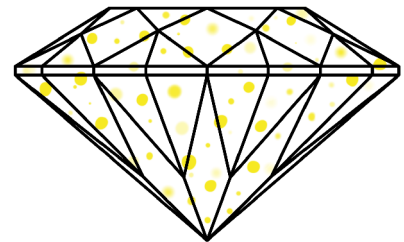

THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR YELLOW DIAMOND

The **Yellow** color of your natural 1.10 carat, Fancy Intense Yellow is attributed to a significant concentration of nitrogen atoms within its structure. These atoms absorb blue light, giving the diamond its distinct yellow hue. The intensity of the yellow color increases with the concentration of nitrogen in the diamond. Therefore, a higher concentration of nitrogen results in a more vibrant yellow appearance.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

The grade **"Intense"** is the Third strongest saturation on the scale and represents **18%** of all Yellow diamonds. Those graded as "Intense" Yellow exhibit powerful saturation and convey a strong color sensation.

There are Four available saturation levels in Yellow color diamonds, Fancy Intense being the Third most saturated.

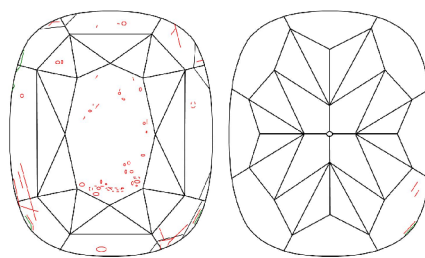

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

The **Cushion** shape dates back to the early days when diamonds were initially made to decorate crowns of royalty. Today, the Cushion shape is still the most popular jewelry shape, and it is also yields the highest possible weight from rough diamonds. The pavilion on the bottom of your stone has a Starburst facet alignment to reinforce color reflection and brilliance. **53%** from all Yellow fancy color diamonds are polished as Cushion / Radiant.



TRUE FACE-UP

The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority.

Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

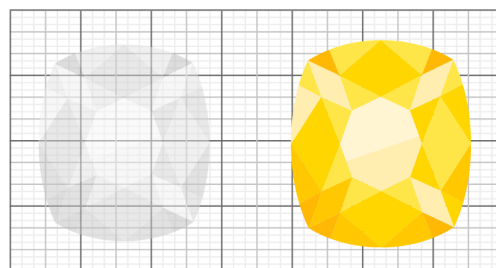

The Face-up of this 1.1 carat Cushion is equivalent to that of a **1.13 - 1.16** carat which is **~4.2% larger** than the average Cushion shape in this weight.

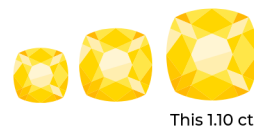

THE SI2 CLARITY IN THIS FANCY INTENSE YELLOW DIAMOND

The impact of the **SI2** clarity, in a Fancy Intense Yellow, Cushion cut, is negligible compared to colorless diamonds especially when it is not visible to the naked eye. The SI2 clarity grade represents 7% of all Fancy Intense Yellow diamonds in the 1 - 1.49 carat weight category.
