THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR YELLOW DIAMOND

The **Yellow** color of your natural 1.10 carat, Fancy Light Yellow is attributed to a significant concentration of nitrogen atoms within its structure. These atoms absorb blue light, giving the diamond its distinct yellow hue. The intensity of the yellow color increases with the concentration of nitrogen in the diamond. Therefore, a higher concentration of nitrogen results in a more vibrant yellow appearance.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

The grade **"Fancy Light"** represents **34%** of all Yellow fancy Color diamonds. Although referred to as "Fancy Light", these diamonds may exhibit a prominent hue, transcending color effectively

There are Four available saturation levels in Yellow color diamonds, Fancy Light being the First most saturated.

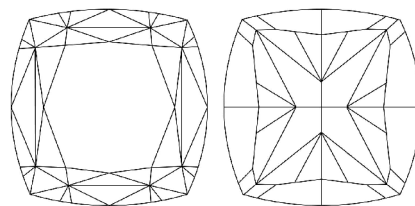

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

The **Cushion** shape dates back to the early days when diamonds were initially made to decorate crowns of royalty. Today, the Cushion shape is still the most popular jewelry shape, and it is also yields the highest possible weight from rough diamonds. The pavilion on the bottom of your stone has a Starburst facet alignment to reinforce color reflection and brilliance. **53%** from all Yellow fancy color diamonds are polished as Cushion / Radiant.



TRUE FACE-UP

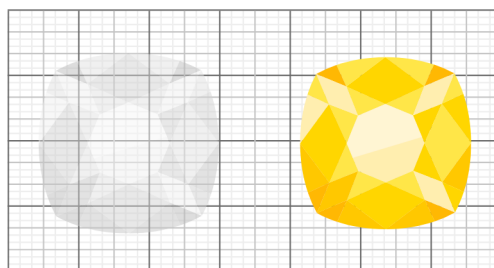
The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority. Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

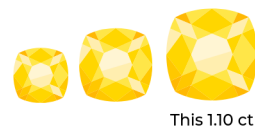

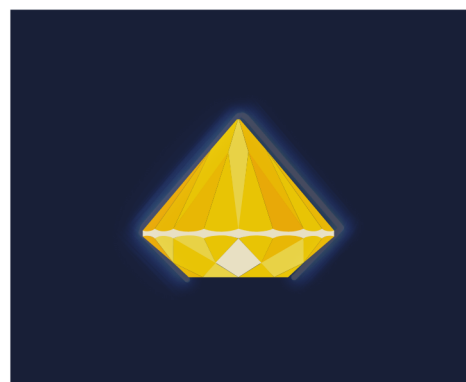
THE FL CLARITY IN THIS FANCY LIGHT YELLOW DIAMOND

Your **Flawless** Fancy Light Yellow with the Cushion shape cut has no internal or external inclusions that can be seen with a professional X10 magnifying glass. Only 4% of all Fancy Light Yellow diamonds in the 1 - 1.49 carat weight category have this extremely rare clarity grade.

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THE FAINT BLUE FLUORESCENT IN THIS DIAMOND

Fluorescence refers to the emission of visible light when a diamond is exposed to UV light. The fluorescence in this diamond is caused by the presence of trace elements within the lattice of the diamond. When a diamond is exposed to UV light, these elements absorb the energy from the UV light. They become excited, and as a result, release energy in the form of a Blue glow. The **Faint Blue** fluorescence in this 1.1 carat has no impact on its quality. It is impossible to spot a glow of this **Faint Blue** Fluorescence in the diamond without a special UV light device.



HOW RARE IS THIS 1.10 CARAT?

- Only **1 in ~ 17,000** diamonds will have similar characteristics
- A mere **100 to 140** similar diamonds enter the market yearly
