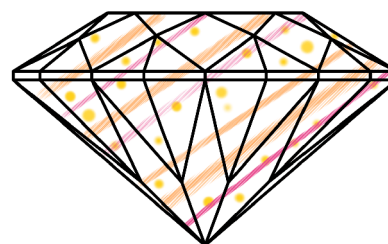

THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR BROWNISH YELLOWISH ORANGE DIAMOND

The **Orange and yellow** hues of this 1.20 carat diamond attest to the presence of nitrogen atoms that absorb blue light and create a dark yellow hue, combined with red luminescence. Diamonds with orange and brown appearance have a distinctive atomic structure that results from immense pressure that deformed their crystal lattice and led to the absorption of a broad range of colors, including purple, blue and green.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

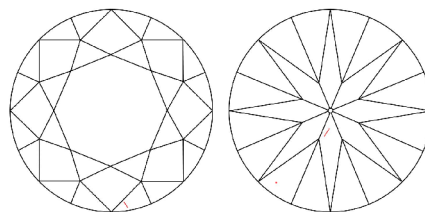
The **"Deep"** grade exhibits an extremely saturated color with a darker tone. This grade represents only **90%** of all Brownish Yellowish Orange diamonds. Fancy "Deep" Brownish Yellowish Orange diamonds give a profound color sensation.

There are Two available saturation levels in Orange color diamonds, Fancy Deep being the Second most saturated. Fancy Deep is as saturated as Vivid; however, it presents a darker tone.

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

Your 1.2 carat **round** brilliant cut diamond is cut and polished with the same facet alignment and an angle of colorless diamonds. fancy color **round** diamonds do not retain color the way modified fancy shapes do and as such, are rarely seen in weights above 0.10 carat. **round** fancy color diamonds in the Intense or Vivid grade fetch a significant premium in comparison to similar diamonds in other shapes. TRUE FACE-UP

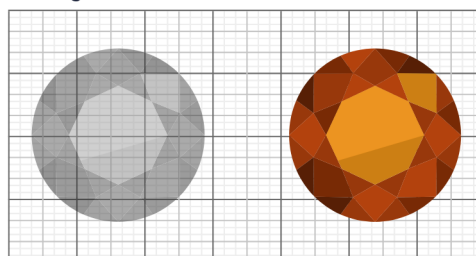
The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority. Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

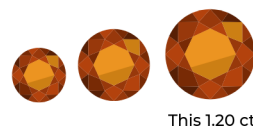

The **VVS** clarity in your Fancy Deep Brownish Yellowish Orange with the Round shape cut, represents only 6% of all Fancy Deep Brownish Yellowish Orange diamonds in the 1 - 1.49 carat weight category.

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THE FAINT BLUE FLUORESCENT IN THIS DIAMOND

Fluorescence refers to the emission of visible light when a diamond is exposed to UV light. The fluorescence in this diamond is caused by the presence of trace elements within the lattice of the diamond. When a diamond is exposed to UV light, these elements absorb the energy from the UV light. They become excited, and as a result, release energy in the form of a Blue glow. The **Faint Blue** fluorescence in this 1.2 carat has no impact on its quality. It is impossible to spot a glow of this **Faint Blue** Fluorescence in the diamond without a special UV light device.



HOW RARE IS THIS 1.20 CARAT?

- Only **1 in ~ 1,000,000** diamonds will have similar characteristics
- A mere **1 to 3** similar diamonds enter the market yearly
