THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR PINKISH PURPLE DIAMOND

The combination of the pink and purple hue in your Fancy Light **Pinkish Purple** 0.50 carat diamond is caused by a fascinating geological phenomenon that occurs when certain diamonds undergo more forcible pressure and heat than others. Diamonds that are exposed to 900° Celsius and manage to withstand the immense pressure underground experience a unique change in their atomic alignment. That's when the magic happens! Scientists believe that when light enters your Fancy Light Pinkish Purple Pear diamond and crosses its special atomic distortion, the light rays bend at an angle that absorbs the green light and creates light waves. Pink diamonds that have a low amount of nitrogen, responsible for the yellow color sensation, will produce a 'colder' that leans towards the purple spectrum.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

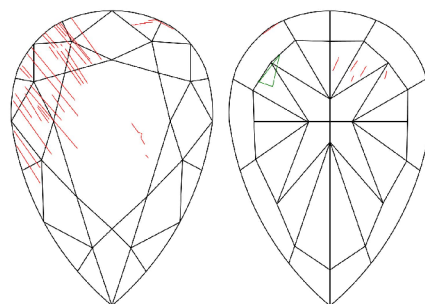
The grade "**Fancy Light**" represents **31%** of all Pinkish Purple fancy Color diamonds. Although referred to as "Fancy Light", these diamonds may exhibit a prominent hue, transcending color effectively

There are Four available saturation levels in Purple color diamonds, Fancy Light being the First most saturated.



THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

This **Pear** -shape's pavilion was modified from a brilliant facet alignment to optimize color retention, hence the name of this shape. Only **23%** from all Pinkish Purple fancy color diamonds are polished as a Pear shape.



TRUE FACE-UP

The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority.

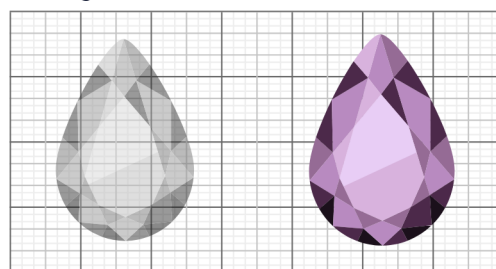
Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

* The data in this section pertains to the relationship between your diamond's face-up dimensions and the average face-up dimensions for relevant weight categories.

The Face-up of this 0.5 carat Pear is equivalent to that of a **0.51 - 0.52 carat** which is **~2.9% larger** than the average Pear shape in this weight.

THE SI1 CLARITY IN THIS FANCY LIGHT PINKISH PURPLE DIAMOND

Most Pinkish Purple fancy color diamonds are formed under greater underground pressure relative to other diamonds. As such, many Pinkish Purple rough diamonds are heavily fractured and cracked and as a result, receive a low clarity grade. Pursuing a high clarity grade during the manufacturing process usually entails a significant weight loss. Fancy Light Pinkish Purple diamonds with **SI1** clarity grade are bought widely and represent 35% of all Fancy Light Pinkish Purple diamonds in the 0.50 - 0.69 carat weight category.
