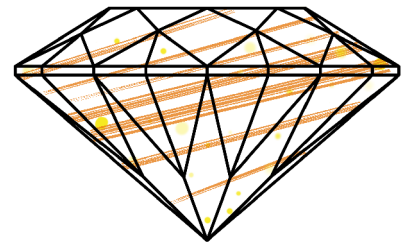

THE CAUSE OF COLOR IN YOUR YELLOW ORANGE DIAMOND

The **Orange and Yellow** hues of this 0.55 carat diamond attest to the presence of nitrogen atoms that absorb blue light and create a yellow hue, combined with red luminescence. Diamonds with orange and yellow appearance have a distinctive atomic structure that results from immense pressure that deformed their crystal lattice and led to the absorption of a broad range of colors, including purple, blue and green.



A WORD ABOUT THE SATURATION OF YOUR DIAMOND

The **"Vivid"** grade is situated at the top of the saturation scale and, in most cases, exhibits a sensational, exciting color. "Vivid" Yellow Orange diamonds represent just **34%** of all Yellow Orange fancy color diamonds.

There are Three available saturation levels in Orange color diamonds, Fancy Vivid being the Third most saturated.

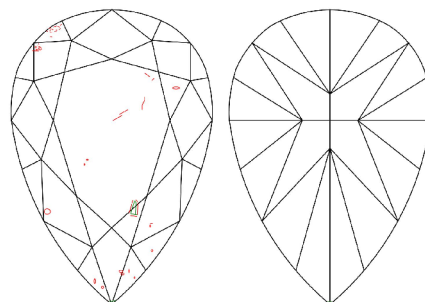

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF THIS DIAMOND'S SHAPE

The **Pear** brilliant cut diamond is a classic shape that appeared in jewelry as early as the 17th century on nobles and royalty. The facet alignment on the pavilion is inspired by the classic Round brilliant, hence the name of this shape. Only **18%** from all Yellow Orange fancy color diamonds are polished as Pear shape.



TRUE FACE-UP

The carat weight and physical size of a diamond are important factors in determining its value. However, when it comes to fancy colored diamonds, there is a tendency to prioritize other visual elements over their size, and as a result, the surface area of the face-up view is not always given high priority. Diamonds that appear slightly smaller are considered to be within the norm. However, diamonds that appear larger in relation to their weight will receive a premium.

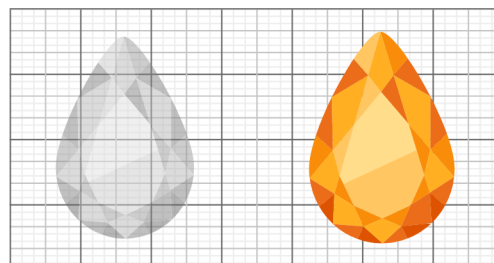

The Face-up of this 0.55 carat Pear is equivalent to that of a **0.57 - 0.58** carat which is **~4.9% larger** than the average Pear shape in this weight.

THE SI1 CLARITY IN THIS FANCY VIVID YELLOW ORANGE DIAMOND

The impact of the **SI1** clarity, in a Fancy Vivid Yellow Orange, Pear cut, is negligible compared to colorless diamonds especially when it is not visible to the naked eye. The SI1 clarity grade represents 25% of all Fancy Vivid Yellow Orange diamonds in the 0.50 - 0.69 carat weight category.

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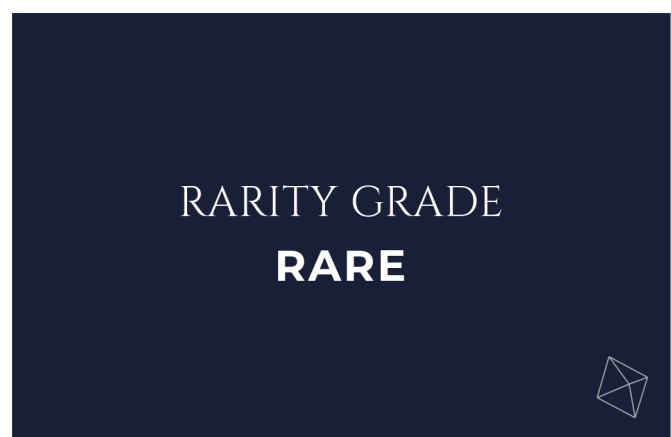
THE MEDIUM YELLOW FLUORESCENT IN THIS DIAMOND

Fluorescence refers to the emission of visible light when a diamond is exposed to UV light. The fluorescence of this diamond is caused by the presence of trace elements within the lattice of the diamond. When a diamond is exposed to UV light, these elements absorb energy from the UV light. They become excited, and as a result, release energy in the form of a yellow glow. **Yellow fluorescence** reinforces the color of this Yellow Orange diamond and will entail a price premium. The stronger the yellow fluorescence, the more attractive the diamond will be.



HOW RARE IS THIS 0.55 CARAT?

- Only **1 in ~ 230,000** diamonds will have similar characteristics
- A mere **6 to 12** similar diamonds enter the market yearly
